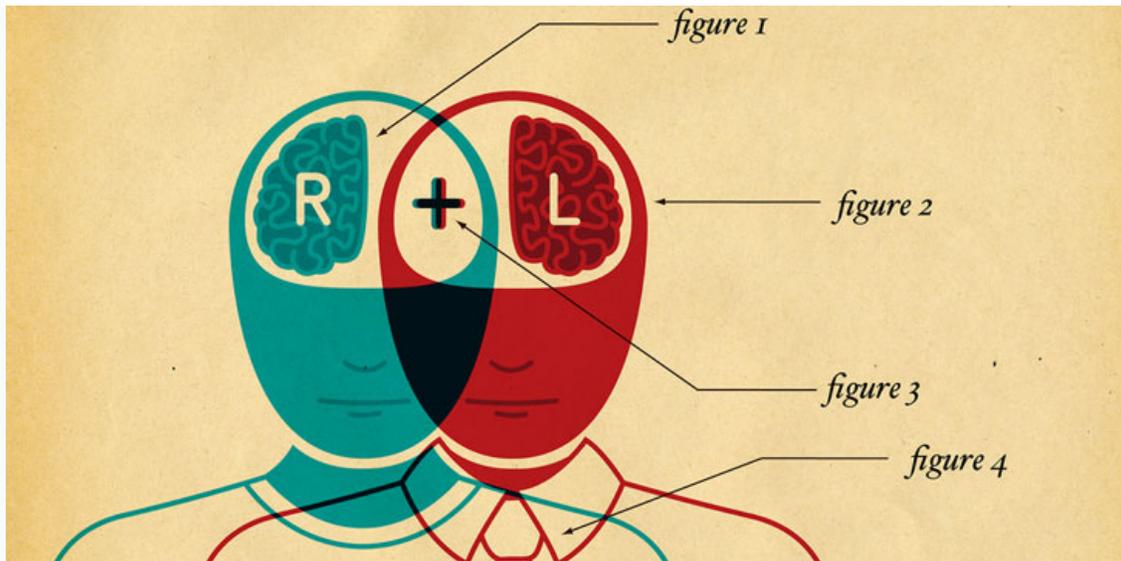
- ***Equal Partaking*** - will provide you and every team member with equal opportunities to participate and communicate their ideas.

- ***Promoting Self-Analysis*** - will challenge you to think, communicate and receive clarity about your capabilities.

- ***Helps in Problem Solving*** - when a variety of knowledge and skills are pooled, it creates a talent pool that is vast and more competent, able and experienced.

- ***It Teaches*** - when collaborating, you are essentially learning new things from each other.

- Team focused- Practice on being a team player where the focus is “we” rather than “I”.

- Curious - Practice asking the right questions as the right time.
- Appreciative - Express appreciation as often as you can.
- Listens to understand - Listen attentively to what is being said.
- Diplomatic - Being diplomatic builds respect and trust mutually no matter how big or small the team is.
